Men's Fours Dusted

The same time as the women got underway so did the men with eight fours teams entered, but a delay on the draw awaiting word from Taranaki if Nigel Drew's team would be back in time for the start. As it happened Drew missed qualifying at Taranaki and his four was there Saturday morning. As with the women the men were playing under the two life system, this would take longer than one day. Four rounds of fifteen ends where down to be played each day. Round one was fairly clean and saw Tony Grantham's four (Mike Turner, Tommy Campbell, Steve Yates) go down to John Hindmarch (Chad Nathan, Mike Haggart, Peter Nathan) (9-19). Robbie Church (Warren Lush, Adam Richardson, Curtis Ennor) bowed down to Evan Thomas (Keith Burgess, Steve Arms, Mike Cartwright) (7-15), Randall Watkins (Jimmy Heath, Jack Huriwai, Merv Garred) pushed Sandy Cleghorn (Robbie Henson, Gary Wallace) below the line (14-8). Nigel Drew (Mark Rumble, Lionel Drew, Martin Short) gave Colin Godfrey (John Hannan, Dennis McSweeney, Barry Reyland) a lesson (21-7).

Round two and above the line in the two lifers zone, Thomas continued his winning momentum downing Hindmarch (14/9). Watkins made surprisingly easy work defeating Drew (18/6). While below the line. Church came away with an impressive win over Grantham (15-5) to send Grantham home. Colin Godfrey was not far behind Grantham, going down (23-4) to Cleghorn.

Round three and what a battle above the line. Watkins getting out to a 10-3 lead before dropping a five (10-8). Thomas pulled in front to lead (12-10), by the tenth end it was all square (12-12). As was after thirteen ends (15-15). Watkins picked up a two on the four-teenth end (17-15) with Thomas just falling short with only a single shot on the fifteenth and drop below the line (17-16). Below the line and those fighting for survival Cleghorn trounced Church (18-4). While Hindmarch picked up a four on end seven to lead Drew (9-

8), but that is where Hindmarch stopped, the next seven ends all went Drew's way (22-9) with the fifteenth not being played.

Round four having been down to play Saturday was moved to Sunday as some of the older players were feeling the going tough. Sunday and Watkins, the only two lifer, was up against a refreshed Sandy Cleghorn with one life. Watkins scored first end with a two. It was not for a further

seven ends before Watkins scored again and at that point Cleghorn held the lead (12-4). After eleven ends Cleghorn held an eight shot lead (14-6). Watkins won the remaining four ends but fell two shots short (13-14) to drop below the line. The Drew Thomas game saw Thomas only score on five (2, 2, 5, 1 & 1 shots) of the fifteen ends to drop out of the championship (11-13).

Round five and three one lifers remained with Cleghorn getting the bye into the final. Drew and Watkins, what many would have picked as the final, where left to fight it out to see who would progress to the final. Watkins drew first blood and picking up a six on end four to lead (8-3). A four on the sixth end helped Watkins cause (12-6), but the following six ends did not as Drew passed Watkins and lead (17-12) after twelve ends. The thirteenth and fourteenth ends were both Watkins (3 & 1 shots) to trail by one shot. Drew picked up a three on the final end (20-15) to end Watkins chance of the title.

Cleghorn's four all relaxed after the bye would have their work cut out against Drew. A side that was battle hardened having spent the week prior playing in the Taranaki Open Men's Fours with eight games of twenty five ends played over four days. After three ends Drew was six zip up. Cleghorn scored the next two ends to trial by two (6-4).Shot traded that end then this end and after ten ends the scores were all locked up (8-8). The following ends saw a two to Cleghorn (8-10) and a two to Drew, to be all locked up again (10-10). The final three ends all went Drew's way to claim the title (14-10) for the 2020-21 season. Mark Rumble's third club championship title for the season, only missing the Triples, that disciple having been taken out by Jimmy Heath, Jack Huriwai and Steve Yates (s), in December where he was in the runners-up team. Next stop Champ of Champ Fours in May.

Hot on the hells of the Charity Tournament and the Carpet Mill \$5,500 Birkenhead Men's Pairs comes The Good Home Birkenhead Women's Pairs with a slightly different feel to it than previous years. While the presence of Karen Murphy in the field last year certainly added another dimension, sadly Covid quashed any plans of Murphy returning this year. It is the regulars that give the tournament its flavour. Many of the tournament regulars now play out of the illustrious Carlton Cornwall club and it just so happens that Carlton have programmed their women's club championship pairs on that weekend. But that hasn't stopped a quality field assembling with new faces and possible future regulars. Fast becoming regulars to Birkenhead, traveling up from the south are Queenstown's Christine Buchanan and Margaret O'Connor. While Papakura's Leeane Poulson pairs up with Bronwyn Stevens from North East Valley. Another pair from the south are first timers Alexandra's Linley O'Callaghan and Waikiwi's Lynda Milne.

Takapuna as in the Carpet Mill Men's Pairs have fielded multiple teams with 2015 tournament winners Anne Doreen and Lisa Parlane, back then playing out of Browns Bay, possibly the most likely out of the Takapuna teams to lift the silverware at the end.

Past Birkenhead member, now out of Mercury Bay Colleen Sexton returns with Mairangi Bay's Jan Gledhill. If Sexton and Gledhill don't make an impact Sexton's husband Brian will as he helps get the greens ready each morning.

Only one half of last year's winning pair Anne Muir returns, Sue Wightman is out injured. Muir has travelled south alone and picked up St Heliers's Catherine Bein to assist in defending the Chinery Swart Cup. Paris Baker, 2019 World Under 25 Women's Champion and recently returned to bowls New Lynn's Olivia Bloomfield are there to make Muir's defence just that bit harder. With twenty-seven Centre titles to her name, one title that has eluded Birkenhead's Ruth Lynch is "The Good Home Women's Pairs". This year Lynch pairs up with Birkenhead club mate and 2019 tournament winner Trish Croot. While Croot prefers to fly below the radar there is no chance of that paired up with Lynch and possibly Birkenhead's best chance of a Birkenhead team taking out the title since Chrissy Peers and Denise Samuel claimed it back in 2012.

2014 winners Kerrin Roberts, Elaine McClintock return for another go with the hope of being the first ladies with their names twice on the Cup. While Tauranga's Mary Campbell and Gayle Melrose will be out to get their names on the cup for the first time.

Pt Chev's Jenny Stockford and Angela Temple, 2019 tournament runners-up return and yet to conquer the tournament will be hoping to do so this year. Sue Curran pairs up with Paula Kampthorne waving the St Heliers's flag while Kelly Clark and Deb Presland wave Helensville's, both teams that can do well with a favourably draw.

If party is what the ladies have come along for, a party they will get as Redcliff's Nikki Henderson and Nicky Reed, aka "The Nickies" hit the club Friday, with the biggest smiles north of the Bombays and an infectious party attitude to suit.

It all gets underway 8.15am Saturday 13 February and concludes with the finals out on the top green starting at around 3pm Sunday 14 February.

Australia Day Honour for Karen Murphy

Former BCiB Australian Jackaroo vice-captain Karen Murphy headlines the list of bowlers to receive Australia Day honours, with appointment as a Member of the Order of Australia (AM).

The Order of Australia recognises Australians who have demonstrated outstanding service or exceptional achievement, with AM being the third highest level of award bestowed by Australia's Governor-General.

Murphy, the nation's most capped international competitor, was recognised for her significant service to bowls as an elite player at international level.

Murphy's deserving accolade comes only 13 months after bowing out of international representation, following a glittering career that include representing the nation at five Commonwealth Games and five World Championships, where she amassed a record-breaking 668 appearances across 23-years of service.

While immensely proud of her career and being a pioneer for women's bowls, Murphy said the accolade still came as a shock.

"It's a bit of a shock, it's a huge honour to have bestowed on you," Murphy told the Illawar-

ra Mercury. "You win things and achieve things but you don't really associate those sort of achievements with this type of thing; I don't really feel like it's mine, I feel like it's for everyone who's been part of my journey, my family, my friends, my sponsors, my club.

"Any sporting career has its highs and its lows, I retired just over 12 months ago after 23 years of playing bowls for Australia, and it's just been an awesome journey. "I feel like I've been a bit of a trailblazer. cer-

tainly in women's

bowls; I really hope that in some way I did break down some barriers and that some young girls did take up the sport because they saw someone like me playing.

"While it's a sport that the older generation can play, it's very inclusive now in that there's a lot of young players, people with disabilities; that's been pleasing for me to see that change and people can see that bowls is a great sport for all."

After learning of her AM accolade, Murphy said the first two people she told were her mum and dad, Lorraine and Frank.

"They had tears in their eyes when I told them, they were so happy," Murphy told the Australian Associated Press.

"It's a lovely thing for them; my dad coached me and encouraged me and it was something that father and daughter could do together.

"Mum and dad have been along with me for the ride for all these years, they've seen the highs and lows, but this is definitely one of the highs."

Steve Glasson Calls Time On Coaching Career

Bowls Australia's most prolific national coach, Steve Glasson OAM, has signalled time on his illustrious coaching career after a decade at the helm of the sport's High Performance program. Glasson relinguishes the coveted but onerous National Coach position having guided the BCiB Australian Jackaroos through a period of unparalleled success on the world stage, since taking the reins in March 2011. Notably, Glasson presided over the best result achieved by any nation at a record-breaking World Bowls Championships in 2012, followed by the Jackaroos' best campaign abroad at a World Bowls Championships in 2016, and culminated in the Jackaroos' most successful Commonwealth Games result in 2018. Underscoring the achievements on the international arena, Glasson is credited as having set the foundations and subsequently developed a first-class culture among all tiers of High Performance squads and has significantly raised the profile of the Jackaroos brand. Stepping away from the coaching ranks entirely, Glasson plans to take a position at BCiB (Bowling Club Insurance Brokers), the naming rights partner of the sport's national team, where he currently serves as an Ambassador. In announcing his decision to step down, Glasson said he felt the time was right to move on to the next stage of his life and career, while affording his replacement the time required to adjust to the position before the next international benchmark event. "It has been a great honour to be the National Coach of the sport I have loved and held dearly throughout my life and I wish to express my heartfelt thanks to Bowls Australia's Directors, past and present, CEO Neil Dalrymple, the High Performance team, inclusive of staff and athletes, and all stakeholders for this incredible privilege," Glasson said. "Throughout the ten-year journey, I have been surrounded and supported by the most amazing, passionate and hardworking team of people, who have been instrumental in achieving the collective successes that we've enjoyed on the international arena. "Whilst united in our desire to earn success on the green, unquestionably, one of the primary drivers and motivators of the High Performance program has been to instil a culture focused on becoming better people, and I feel that I have personally grown and developed through my involvement and benefited as a result.

"I'm immensely proud of the inclusiveness that's been built steadily throughout the program, with a focus on mixed gender and para-sport, under-age and over-60 opportunities. "Personally, I feel the time is right to move to a new phase of my life, so I wish the High Performance program and all involved the very best of luck for future endeavours and assure everyone that I will always remain an avid supporter and follower of the team's progress and development."

Bowls Australia President Bob Boorman said the organisation and the bowls community more broadly were appreciative of Glasson's decade of service.

"The sport of Bowls has benefited greatly from the guidance and service Steve has imparted over the past ten years," Boorman said.

"The accolades that the BCiB Australian Jackaroos squad have achieved during Steve's tenure speak volumes for the amount of hard work and energy he has placed on developing a results-driven culture of proven performers, but just as importantly, he has established and led an excellent High Performance team and created a culture of good, honest, supportive people. "Steve is a great character and personality in the sport of Bowls in Australia and has made an excellent contribution as a player and more recently as Coach; we wish him well for his future and intend to discuss a level of continued involvement with Bowls Australia at some point in the future."

The past 11 months have unquestionably been a difficult period, void of national and international events and with limited access to personnel for training and development due to COVID-19, but Glasson's selfless timing provides his successor with the best opportunity to prepare for September's World Bowls Championships and the next Commonwealth Games in eighteen months' time.

Bowls Australia's Board and Executive plan to review the National Coach position and High Performance structure before advising plans for the successor.

Spotlight on Club Partners

This week we put the spotlight on "The Birkenhead Licensing Trust". Although not a sponsor, but with the Trust's support over the years the club has benefited from many grants.

The Trust is a net proceeds-committee of the Lion Foundation and is responsible for approving grant funding to the local community groups in Birkenhead and surrounding areas from gaming funds generated by Lion Foundation. The Birkenhead Licensing Trust was established in 1967 after voters decided that the Birkenhead Council area should change from 'dry' to 'wet' under the control of a licensing trust. In 1970 the Birkenhead Trust Hotel was opened, with catering facilities designed to cater for all locals. A period of expansion was followed by the economic slump of the late 1980s, the recipe for a loss-making enterprise. In 1992 the trust hotel complex was sold and only the wholesale outlet retained. The Birkenhead Licensing Trust then sat for a number of years, accumulating revenue through the wholesale outlet and distributing interest accrued to local community groups. Meanwhile local licensing reins were loosened, allowing other operators to apply for li-

censes. In the interim the Trust sought other suitable sites. In 2002 the Slipp Inn Pub had been opened by Allen Vaughan, who had a long history with Lion Breweries. In 2006 the Trust approached Mr Vaughan with an offer to buy the Slipp Inn, as it seemed a good fit for several reasons: the Trust is a netproceeds committee of the Lion Foundation; grant funding to the local community comes from funds generated by Lion Foundation;

the Trust was already the pub's landlord; the

pub fitted the family-friendly ideal of the Trust; and the gambling facility was a source of revenue. The Pub undertook extensive renovations and was reborn as "The Good Home Birkenhead" But, you ask, what is the difference between a Trust operation and a private or brewery owned enterprise? Well, all profits from bar and restaurant sales and gaming proceeds are distributed in the local community through the Lion Foundation, rather than going into a big national pool for distribution nationally. As Mr Vaughan points out, "The Trust does a lot of good in the community, it is not self-rewarding or ruled by self-interest, there are no paid directorships, and all six trustees are chosen by the electorate in the local body elections. As a result close to \$1 million annually has gone back into the community in recent years." The Trust also owns the Glenfield pub Inn Field; revenues go back into the Birkenhead, Glenfield and Northcote areas from both establishments.
