Shane first joined the Birkenhead Club in the 2000-2001 season. There's no doubting that he had a natural ability for the game. He had a good delivery, a good listener and he practiced. like most of us he had decided winning is more fun than losing and most all was a good sport. His record reads well. He won the under Five singles, Pairs and Fours. His Senior Record was Champ Pairs 2x. Triples 2x Singles 1. Fours 1.

There's no doubt he loved the game and enjoyed the company, he was a pleasure to play with.

Shane as you may know was plagued with ill health from age Seven ,he had a loving

Family which ensured he got the best possible Medical care and Shane of course decided he was going to lead as normal a life as his health dictated.

I remember when his health took a downward turn and he was hospitalised . It had got to the stage when Shane required a Heart and Kidney replacement and there was some doubt as to weather Shane was in good enough condition to survive this. At the last-minute Doctors decided to put Shan on the organ waiting list. Unbelievably a new Heart become available within a week and in a nick of time. Ian McCallam and I visited Shane before the operation to wish well. In conversation I asked Shane who would he like to play next Season, he named his Fours team. We confirmed they would be ready... we left Hospital and it was no surprise to see Big Mac shedding a few tears.

The Heart Transplant went well on day one followed be the Kidney transplant on day two. Shane made an amazing recovery and joined his team the following Season. Shane's return to green went well he was selected to play to the pairs for the North Harbour Reps partnering his old



friend Rod Mahon. I will remember the good times, the trips to the Taranaki Fours, the competitions we played in the fun we had. You were the best of friends.

It was wonderful that you meet Natalie who was to become his loving partner for the remainder of his Life,

Thank you for coming my way Shane and save a place in your team for me Coach

### **Shane Gibson**

Shane Gibson, who was admired by all in the North Harbour centre for his courage in battling a battery of health issues, passed away last week, aged in his mid 40s.

Despite his many ailments, Shane was something of medical marvel, becoming an excellent bowler who represented North Harbour regularly at junior, development and open levels.

In 2007 at the age of 30 he underwent both heart and kidney transplants. These came after a virtual lifetime of health struggles which started with a rare blood disorder in his childhood.

By the age of 11 he had had a marrow transplant and his organs were so weakened that before he was 30 he had suffered 12 heart attacks and had 11 stents inserted. As a youngster Shane had been a promising tennis player and because of his health he switched in 2000 to the gentler exercise of bowls.

Most of his bowls was at the Birkenhead club, where he came under the wing of stalwarts like Keith Burgess, Lionel Drew and especially Rod Mahon.

He won several club titles, including against a strong field in 2006 the open singles when he was on dialysis. But despite being in six finals a centre open title eluded him. At national level he suffered similar frustration when in 2010 he and Mahon were narrowly beaten in the Trusts New Zealand Open at Henderson in the pairs final. That year Shane also made the singles semi-finals and the triples quarter-finals.

His bowls feats were matched by his academic achievements: a business studies degree from Massey University and studies and lecturing roles in sports management.

He worked for a time for Bowls New Zealand and in 2018 was appointed North Harbour's secretary-manager, only for his health to force him to step down after a brief period. It was typical of his spirit that just before Christmas, when he knew his time was up, he posted on Facebook a farewell filled with humour to his many friends. Rest in peace, Shane.

A celebration of Shane Gibson's life will be held today, Wednesday 11 January at 2pm at All Saints Chapel, Purewa Cemetery, 100 St John's Road, Meadowbank.

### Lachie Love: Heartbroken family of 8-year-old with aggressive brain tumour want year of joy for son

When larger-than-life Lachie Love tells friends about the new scar across the back of his head he jokes it is from a shark.

The 8-year-old boy "with a sparkle in his eyes" knows it really has something to do with the "egg in his head affecting his vision", but for Lachie, the shark story is a bit more fun. For his parents, Andy and Liesje Love, the scar represents every parent's worst nightmare and came after their son was diagnosed with an incurable brain tumour.

The Auckland schoolboy was diagnosed with an aggressive brain tumour called Diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma (DIPG) on December 29.

The family first realised something was not right when Lachie started squinting in one eye just before Christmas.

"We thought it was a bit weird but we thought perhaps there was just some visual things going on," mum Liesje said.
"The next day he had a bit of a lazy eye and there were other things like issues with his

sleep, waking at midnight, and being restless."

A visit to the optometrist saw Lachie prescribed glasses but because of how suddenly the issues cropped up he was also referred to an ophthalmologist for further testing. Within days there were further referrals, a trip to Starship children's hospital, MRIs, a biopsy and then the diagnosis.

"That diagnosis was horrendous to hear. It was absolutely devastating." Liesje said. "Our amazing GP had already seen it come through and she spoke to us beforehand she wanted us to go in and be able to talk about the options of treatment and not just hear the diagnosis.

"A lot of people hear the word cancer or tumour and they switch off - they don't hear anything else.'

As a clinical psychologist who has worked at Starship helping families cope with diagnosis and grief, Leisje knows better than most of the challenges her family has before them.

"It's time for me to walk the talk," she said.

She also knows the unfortunate prognosis of children with tumours like Lachie's. They know there is no proven treatment for DIPG apart from radiation therapy to shrink the tumour and give Lachie as much time as possible to enjoy his life.

On Wednesday Lachie will have a mask fitting for his radiation therapy, which will start in a couple of weeks.

He'll have six weeks of radiation as an outpatient, and rescan after a couple of weeks. There are other clinical trials Liesje and husband Andy will look at, but they know it is a condition so difficult to treat there have been no breakthroughs.

"We will talk to the doctors and work with them and we will consider complimentary treatment elsewhere and abroad but we will always be asking if this is for him or if it is for us. "Is it quality of life or quantity?"

What the family will do is make the next year the best they can for Lachie and his 6-yearold brother Harry.

Liesje's sister Nikki Donkin has set up a "Givealittle page" in the hope of raising funds so Leisje and Andy can spend as much time as possible with Lachie and make some of his dreams come true.

"Lachie is a big personality and he loves music," Leisje said.

"We had a karaoke party recently and he was up past midnight singing to Guns N' Roses and Imagine Dragons with the adults."

He would like to see Ed Sheeran in concert and would love to see Blake Shelton as well. The family are hoping to take Lachie to Universal Studios or to see Harry Potter World as well as rest and relaxation on the beach in Florida.

Donkin describes her nephew as a boy with a sparkle in his eyes and an overflowing

"He is 'big' in every sense of the word – full of energy, love and life," she said.

"We want to raise money so they can afford to take time off work and make some memories with Lachie and give him some amazing experiences."

The money would also be used to explore all available treatment options, including clinical trials.

SUMMERSET NATIONAL SINGLES & PAIRS CHAMPIONS 2023

### Champions crowned as 2023 Summerset Nationals conclude

Gore bowler Sheldon Bagrie-Howley has run out the winner of the 2023 Summerset National Men's Singles, defeating two-time winner and reigning world singles champion Shannon McIlroy in an entertaining finals' display.

In the early stages of the contest, McIlroy proved to be in devastating touch on the Browns Bay green, displaying an array of exquisite draw play and attacking shots to jump out to an 11-5 lead. However, such was the tenacity of Southland representative Bagrie-Howley, the Gore Rams skipper was able to weather the storm and peg back the deficit - eventually going in front, 18-15.

A three-count on what proved to be the final end concluded proceedings, gifting Bagrie-Howley his second national title and denying McIlroy his Gold Star - that performance having to wait a little longer, perhaps next month in the Summerset National Fours or Mixed Pairs.

Bagrie-Howley, who has been on the New Zealand selection radar for guite some years, moreso in the last few seasons - has now stamped his name in the country's bowls folklore, winning the men's national singles at the 2023 Summerset Nationals and undoubtedly pushing his case for further honours in the coming months.

Beaten semi-finalists were Carlton Cornwall's Petar Sain and Mt Albert hopeful Gary Lawson, with McIlroy prevailing 21-13 opposite Lawson and Bagrie-Howley scraping a one-point advantage opposite Sain.

Meanwhile, after five years of trying, including several near misses, Clare Hendra and Tayla Bruce have finally cracked the winning formula and can now call themselves national pairs' champions.

The final saw Hendra and Bruce get out to a comfortable lead opposite the Takapuna pairing of Wendy Jensen and Robyne Walker – settling into the green quicker than their opposition and working hard to retain the advantage throughout.

Despite a spirited fightback from the North Harbour duo, Jensen and Walker were unable to overturn the deficit, and eventually succumbed to the will and desire of Hendra and Bruce, both so desperately wanting, this time, to get over the line.

The win moves Bruce within one title of her Gold Star, while for Hendra, this marks her second. Notable mention must also go to Bruce, who has now appeared in all four consecutive finals of the women's singles and pairs in the last two seasons - with Bruce able to secure two titles in those attempts.

Beaten semi-finalists were composite pairing Janeen Noble and Robyn Schischka and Hinuera's Karen De Jongh and Deb White, with Jensen and Walker making light work of Noble/Schischka, 21-3 and Hendra and Bruce proving too strong for the Hinuera duo, 16

In other results, the New Zealand para combination of Graham Skellern and Bruce Wakefield hung tough to win the open disability pairs honour, defeating the formidable line-up of Steve Delaney and Jonathan Radka, 18-11.

The win marked Skellern's fourth national para title in as many years, with Wakefield chalking up his second.

After eight action-packed days in the Auckland and North Harbour centres, weather disruptions, quick thinking logistics and a tonne of skill from competitors, our first set of 2023 champions have been found. These are Selina Goddard (Women's Singles), Sheldon Bagrie-Howley (Men's Singles), Gary Lawson, Tony Grantham (Men's Pairs), Clare Hendra, Tayla Bruce (Women's Pairs), Darron Wolland (Open Disability Singles) and Graham Skellern, Bruce Wakefield (Open Disability Pairs).
