Open Again?

The Club reopens Monday 31st August (greens remain closed) from 3.30pm. We are excited to welcome back our members, but we are limited, due to social distancing restrictions, to the number of persons in the Club. We are open to members only, No Visitors, guests or children and reciprocal visiting rights have also been temporarily suspended. Contact tracing, a simple written register is available at the main entrance or members may opt for the government's NZ COVID Tracer App, QR codes are in place at all entry points.

There are social distancing restrictions in place, seating, gaming lounge and more. No pool or darts. Members are to be seated at tables, with tables and seating spaced out to give the required 1m social distancing. Adhering to the regulations/directives allows the Club to open under Alert Level 2. Members that ignore or flout these may find themselves denied entry until Level 1, as they put Club's livelihood and enjoyment of other members at risk.

Contact Tracing Under Alert Level 2

It is now mandatory for businesses including clubs to display the NZ COVID Tracer App QR Code for contact tracing purposes. The rules for contact tracing have changed slightly since May and there has been a little confusion around the requirements. The current COVID-19 Public Health Response (Alert Levels 3 and 2) Order 2020 requires

businesses to:

- display a copy of the QR code for the business or service in a prominent place at or near the main entrances to the workplace; and
- have other systems and processes in place to support contact tracing of persons who enter the workplace or carry out work for the business or service;

Those other systems and processes are mainly focused on having a manual solution for people who do not have a smart phone or the NZ COVID Tracer App. All those entering the Birkenhead Bowling Club premise are to use the NZ COVID Tracer App QR code or complete the manual contact tracing form, this applies to everyone, no exceptions, club entrances are covered by CCTV for the safety of all our members.



Club Night Fridays

Club Night Fridays have survived Level 3 lockdown but have changed under Level 2. Friday week (Friday 4 September) as we adjust to Level 2 restrictions in the Clubrooms we see the return of the Friday meat raffles and Joker 500 both on sale, but they will not be walked. The Members Draw will remain on hold until social distancing restrictions are reduce to a suitable level.

TAB and Gaming

The TAB and gaming machines will be back in operation under Level 2. The area around the TAB, marked on the floor in yellow is a one person only space, one person in, one person out. This is to meet social distancing requirements. The Gaming Lounge is only three players at a time with 1 metre separation and no spectators. Players are asked to be mindful of other members waiting to have their turn to play the machines. The Birkenhead Bowling Club is committed continuing to promoting responsible gambling.

Play Cancelled Until

All play out on the greens has been cancelled through to and including Friday 11 September. Sunday 13 September will see the greens open at 9am for our first Sunday Tournament of the 2020-21 season.

Rob Parrella Revolutionary Influence

Through the ages, there are not many athletes that can lay claim to have single-handedly changed the way their sport was played.

Sure, there have been a number of breathtakingly brilliant teams who have broke new ground and forward-thinking coaches who have been credited as revolutionaries, but few athletes have been labelled the same way.

Jack Nicklaus overpowered golf courses and set the trend for today's big-hitters, Steffi Graff was arguably the first aggressive baseliner in women's tennis, while the NBA has made a series of rule changes since the mid-90s to replicate more Michael Jordans. While he may lack the global profile of the aforementioned names, Rob Parrella's arrival on the international scene in the early-80s brought swagger and aggression to the sport of bowls that upended the way the game was traditionally played.

Parrella represented Australia on 127 occasions (cap no. 71), including at three Commonwealth Games, in three different countries (Brisbane 1982, Auckland 1990, Victoria 1994), for all three possible medals in the blue-ribbon Men's Singles discipline.

He became the first Australian to win a singles gold medal at Auckland 1990, paving the way for future singles gold medallists, Kelvin Kerkow OAM (Melbourne 2006) and Aaron Wilson (Gold Coast 2018).

Prior to his arrival, the sport was largely conducted in a genteel fashion, with graceful draw play and for the most part, a mild-mannered temperament on the green.

Parrella instead likened his approach to the sport to that of a boxer in the ring, endeavouring to physically and mentally

batter the opponent, with an aggressive style of play and a level of charisma unmatched by his peers. This is where his famous driving style came to the fore, which has since formed the blueprint of many modern-day bowlers.

"You see in those days, it [driving] worked a bit more than what it does these days, because now you have the re-spot [of the jack]," Parrella said.

"In the first few ends, I used to attack a lot; if my opposition got very close to the jack, I used to attack at the head as much as possible.

"Of course, I was good at it. I didn't miss much!

"I used to use it like a boxing match; the first few ends you soften them [opposition] up and then they go into defence.

"That was the way I played the game, in the singles especially."

Parrella was born in Italy and made the natural progression from bocce to bowls when his family arrived in Australia in the 1950s, settling in Inglewood before eventually moving to Brisbane in the late-60s where he would discover the sport of bowls.

He credits his childhood playing bocce as having a significant impact on his weight-control ability in bowls, while years of manual labour on his father's tobacco farm when growing up added a hardened edge to his psyche.

Parella cut a polarising figure with his playing style during his years of dominance in the 1980s and 1990s, but the 76-year-old would like to be remembered as an "entertainer of the sport."

"There were a lot of ups and downs in my career, but I enjoyed every minute of it," Parrella added.

"I always wore my heart on my sleeve and I always will. I played the game the way I wanted to play it. I did it my way, in other words." The Birkenhead Bowling Club

Spotlight on Club Partners

This week we put the spotlight on "The Birkenhead Licensing Trust". Although not a sponsor, but with the Trust's support over the years the club has benefited from many grants. These grants have enabled the Club to expand and provided a modern environment for members and guests to enjoy.

The Trust is a net proceeds-committee of the Lion Foundation and is responsible for approving grant funding to the local community groups in Birkenhead and surrounding areas from gaming funds generated by Lion Foundation.

The Birkenhead Licensing Trust was established in 1967 after voters decided that the Birkenhead Council area should change from 'dry' to 'wet' under the control of a licensing trust.

In 1970 the Birkenhead Trust Hotel was opened, with catering facilities designed to cater for all locals.

A period of expansion was followed by the economic slump of the late 1980s, the recipe for a loss-making

enterprise. In 1992 the trust hotel complex was sold and only the wholesale outlet retained.

The Birkenhead Licensing Trust then sat for a number of years, accumulating revenue through the wholesale outlet and distributing interest accrued to local community groups. Meanwhile local licensing reins were loosened, allowing other operators to apply for licenses.

In the interim the Trust sought other suitable sites. In 2002 the Slipp Inn Pub had been opened by Allen Vaughan, who had a long history with Lion Breweries. In 2006 the Trust approached Mr Vaughan with an offer to buy the Slipp Inn, as it seemed a good fit for several reasons: the Trust is a net-proceeds committee of the Lion Foundation; grant funding to the local community comes from funds generated by Lion Foundation; the Trust was already the pub's landlord; the pub fitted the family-friendly ideal of the Trust; and the gambling facility was a source of revenue. The Pub undertook extensive renovations and was reborn as "The Good Home Birkenhead"

But, you ask, what is the difference between a Trust operation and a private or breweryowned enterprise? Well, all profits from bar and restaurant sales and gaming proceeds are distributed in the local community through the Lion Foundation, rather than going into a big national pool for distribution nationally.

As Mr Vaughan points out, "The Trust does a lot of good in the community, it is not selfrewarding or ruled by self-interest, there are no paid directorships, and all six trustees are chosen by the electorate in the local body elections. As a result close to \$1 million annually has gone back into the community in recent years."

The Trust also owns the Glenfield pub Inn Field; revenues go back into the Birkenhead, Glenfield and Northcote areas from both establishments.
